Remember to include a detailed drawing of Medusa's face, showing the venomous snakes that sprouted from her head instead of hair. If you re- write the story make sure you include different openers, adjectives, conjunctions and interesting vocabulary. You might even like to change the end of the story- what else could have happened?	with the answer of 10, 20, 50 or 100. You can use addition and subtraction. To challenge yourself you could also use multiplication and division- think about doubling and halving.	pottery and create a design for an ancient Greek jug or bowl. You could choose a scene from Greek mythology to represent in your artwork or maybe another familiar story. Remember to use colours typical of Greek art, such as black, white, red and yellow.
Draw a picture of a Greek God or Mortal. You can label your picture with some interesting facts. To challenge yourself write a description of the Greek God/Mortal with lots of interesting facts. You could even make a fact file!	Create a maths poster about 2d and 3d shapes. Remember to include words such as, sides, corners, edges, vertices and faces. How many facts can you include?	Look carefully at the shapes of the letters of the Greek alphabet. Practise forming them and pronouncing them. Can you teach the alphabet to your family?
<u>PE</u> Take part in a homemade PE/ sports activity. This might be a walk, exploring where you live, a race, a bike ride, a bouncing competition on a trampoline or even a game of football, it's up to you. You could share your activity on Facebook or describe it in your book.	<u>Values Poster</u> Make a poster about what responsibility means to you! You can make this as creative as you like	<u>Cooking Challenge</u> Taste or make some traditional Greek dishes such as moussaka, figs, goat's cheese or taramasalata. Write a food review, describing what you have eaten.
